# LENT—WHAT WILL YOU DO?

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent and our forty day Lenten journey to Easter. Lenten spiritual practices include Fasting, Almsgiving/Serving, and Prayer.

We think of Lent as a time to give up meat or chocolate or some other indulgences. But a fast is the opening of our hearts and stripping ourselves of everything that is an obstacle to the gift of God's grace. Fasting is disposing ourselves; to empty ourselves in order to be full of Christ Jesus and God. What if we gave up judgment, greed, fear, lies, gossip, anxiety, evil, apathy, discontent, discouragement, and hatred?

Almsgiving is more than the act of giving. It is an attitude of the heart; a heart that is humble, repentant, merciful and compassionate. Almsgiving is often expressed by serving God and others with discernment, sacrifice, love and care. It may be reflected in the giving of canned goods to the food pantry, sharing old glasses that bring improved sight to someone in the world, donating to causes that bring healing to a hurting world, or recycling to conserve resources and our earth.

In prayer we allow ourselves to be loved by God, as we open ourselves in an attitude of listening and conversation – being present to God. Prayer is a time when we unite ourselves to Jesus and to the Church, and a time when we open ourselves to the breath of the Holy Spirit who makes all things new. Prayer is a

# Susan Kazue Imoto—Nominated for 2017 Woman of the Year

Rev. Richard Kuyama and Rev. KarenFay nominated Susan Kazue Imoto for 2017 Woman of the Year. The Downtown Los Angeles Chapter of the Japanese American Citizen League and the Japanese Women's Society of Southern California has hosted an annual Women of the Year Luncheon since 1963. Their selection criteria are based on service to the community, contributions to pertpetuate the Japanese culture, career professionalism, as well as the strength and courage of women who have held a family together in the face of adversity. Susan K. Imoto, aka Imoto Sensei, of Kotobuki No Kai, Minyo dance that practices at Centenary UMC, is very deserving of this nomination and honor.

#### Biography

Imoto Hoshunjyu was born on October 28, 1944 to Michiko Kawagishi and Yoshiaki Fujinami, who was serving in the army in Shinkyo, Manchuria, China at the time. In 1946 at the age of two, the family returned to Kushimoto-cho, Tahara, Wakayama, Japan where both the Fujinami and Kawagishi families were from. There, she attended Tahara Elementary and Junior High Schools, and Koza High School.

In 1960 the Fujinami family moved to the United States and settled in Boyle Heights, California. She attended Roosevelt High School and graduated in 1964. Through church Bible studies and social events, she met Ted Takafumi Imoto, and in 1967 they married. They have 3 children and 8 grandchildren.

While raising three children, she attended East Los Angeles College in the evenings and received an Associates of Arts degree in Child Development. She began working as a head teacher at the International Institute of Los Angeles. Subsequently, she worked at Keiro Retirement Home where there was a high need for a Japanese bilingual social worker.

She retired at the age of 50 when her first grandson was born.

As a mother of Japanese descent, she wanted to instill Japanese cultural values and experiences for her children. Her son took kendo lessons and is now a sensei. Her two daughters joined the Fujima Kansuma Kai, a Japanese classical dance group, and they both have their Natori statuses. It was with the Fujima Kansuma Kai that she developed a greater passion for odori (dance). For about 25 years she supported her girls in odori by taking them to classes and performances, making costumes and props for the group, and learning how to dress them in their kimono costumes and apply kabuki style make up.

After her daughters married and had their own family lives, she began her own personal learning of dance from Kawamura Sensei with the Nippon Minyo Kenkyu Kai from 1993 to 2009. Under Kawamura Sensei, she achieved her Natori and Shihan statuses as Imoto Hoshunjyu, and continued to dance until her sensei's retirement. In the Spring of 2009, Imoto Sensei opened her own Minyo dance group, Kotobuki No Kai, and became the head of the Los Angeles Nippon Minyo Kenkyu Kai. The group currently practices at Centenary United Methodist Church in Little Tokyo, Los Angeles.

Imoto Sensei shares her passion for Minyo by volunteering her time to teach anyone who wants to learn to dance. These include her regular Kotobuki No Kai students, as well as Keiro Retirement Home residents, Nisei Week public dancers, members of the Taiwan Center, and some private students. Through Minyo she and her students perform throughout the Southern California area at such venues as



Tanabata Festival, Cherry
Blossom Festivals, Long Beach
Aquarium, Kite Festival, Asian
Expo, Wakayama Kenjinkai Picnic,
Annual Kenjin Kyogikai Charity
Show, and Nanka Minyo Kyokai
Aki No Minyo Show.

In addition to her dance, she has served as a Trustee for Centenary United Methodist Church, the Treasurer of Wakayama Kenjin Kai Women's Club, and the Secretary of the Nanka Minyo Kyokai. She also enjoys cooking, sewing, singing, crafts and travel.

# Pastor's Pen


